Law Enforcement Training Center in LaGrange was full of dedicated and interested enforcement professionals.



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In addition to experienced volunteers that are members of GERL, GERL was and always is extremely fortunate to have very knowledgeable, experienced and willing instructors for this event.



Our EXPERT Instructors were:

- *Mat Thompson*, Georgia Department of Agriculture (GDA), Equine Manager
- o Mat Thompson manages the GDA Equine Health Section which is responsible for enforcing the Humane Care for Equines Act, the Equine Act of 1969 and excerpts of the Animal Protection Act. Enforcement of these laws is achieved through the inspection of equine sales, abuse complaints, stables and events under his direction.
- At this training, Mat Thompson delivered information on Georgia Equine Protection Laws and described what constitutes equine abuse. He instructed how to body score horses and loves to share his experience in horse handling. He also graciously helps to provide live horses for horse handling practice during this session.
- *Kevin Hearst,* Retired Field Supervisor/Chief Cruelty Investigator for Dekalb County Animal Services. We are honored to have Kevin share his expertise for this training. Kevin has been a member of our National Animal Cruelty Investigations School faculty for over seven years and is recognized as an expert in the field of animal cruelty investigations. This school is written into policy in several jurisdictions throughout the United States

and has been recognized as one of the leaders in education for humane investigators. Kevin is the primary reasons for this honor. He has been asked to and delivered many presentations for conferences throughout the nation. (Retired) He served as DeKalb Animal Services & Enforcement Academy director, Lead field supervisor and Chief cruelty investigator for our (Animal cruelty Taskforce). He also served as liaison In-service instructor for DeKalb Co. Police Academy, Sheriff Office, Code Enforcement, Emergency Management Agency and District Attorney & Solicitor-General's offices. He served as an expert witness due to his extensive knowledge, training, and experience in animal cruelty/ equine, dangerous animal and blood sports investigations.

Kevin never fails to present an information filled and humorous account of his experiences concerning the proper way to carry out and document animal abuse cases. In addition to keeping full attention of the participants, Kevin shared amazing knowledge, passed out actual photographs of some of his past cases to have team participation in the class which included all of the attendees. They examined the photographs and gave their combined analysis of the pertinent details. Much is learned from this exercise and the interaction within the class.

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# **Multi-County Equine Training for Law Enforcement**

Jessica provided detailed information concerning what she, or any prosecuting attorney needs in order to successfully prepare a case which would insure a conviction. What would be the value in doing all of the work it takes to issue and execute a warrant, prepare a case, and then loose the case or have it dismissed for lack of evidence. While we are saving these animals from abuse, the offender repeats the abuse all over again if not convicted.

In addition to information provided in the training facility, we also provided practice and instruction with a live horse outdoors (transported to the event by GDA, Equine Inspectors) to those interested in learning about the nature of horses and effective ways to interact with them. Demonstrations and hands on training was provided in evaluating a horse that has been neglected, how to handle them, their body score and various handling demonstrations. Some of the officers had not had interaction with horses in the past, as this training provided basics to enable them to handle and make better decisions in the welfare of the animal.

# **Multi-County Equine Training for Law Enforcement**

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All of our experienced speakers were passionate about protecting all animals, through the use of our laws, and making sure offenders are punished. GERL shares this passion. Several GERL Volunteers (Patty Livingston, Cynthia Anderson, Linda Kundell and Gloria Bell) provided lunch for all, gave out door prizes to several lucky attendees, and class outline and documents. All attendees were presented a Certificate of Training and those with the need, were provided six P.O.S.T. Certification Hours.

These ongoing training classes are sponsored by GERL to carve a path in solving the problem of too many unwanted horses, overbreeding, and unnecessary abuse and neglect. Patty Livingston, GERL President has created a "Get Well Plan" which was created to help prevent the increasing neglect. Two parts to the plan are (1.) to provide education to law enforcement, animal control agencies, and the community, and (2.) push for prosecution, fines, and punishment of neglectful and abusive owners. GERL's next equine training will take place in Cobb County on November 25, 2019.

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# Puttin' On The Feed Bag Recipe

#### 4 eggs

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<sup>y</sup>umpkin Bar

- 1 2/3 cups white sugar
- 1 cup vegetable oil1 (15 ounce) can pumpkin puree
- 2 cups all-purpose flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon baking soda
- 2 teaspoons ground cinnamon1 teaspoon salt1 (3 ounce) package cream cheese, softened
- 1/2 cup butter, softened
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
- ✓ 2 cups sifted confectioners' sugar

Preheat oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). In a medium bowl, mix the eggs, sugar, oil, and pumpkin with an electric mixer until light and fluffy. Sift together the flour, baking powder, baking soda, cinnamon and salt. Stir into the pumpkin mixture until thoroughly combined. Spread the batter evenly into an ungreased 10x15 inch



jellyroll pan. Bake for 25 to 30 minutes in preheated oven. Cool before frosting.

To make the frosting, cream together the cream cheese and butter. Stir in vanilla. Add confectioners' sugar a little at a time, beating until mixture is smooth. Spread evenly on top of the cooled bars. Cut into squares.

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# **Horse Trailering Tips**

Learn how to improve your horse's trailering trips.

The following 10 suggestions are based on researchers' current knowledge of shipping's effects, but as more is learned, these guidelines may change. Any stress-reducing measures you can implement will improve your horse's response to his time on the road.

#### 1. Leave horses untied--or tied long--while they travel.

Researchers agree that a horse who can lower his head below the point of his shoulder will be much less likely to suffer respiratory stress from traveling. Some trailer designs do not allow horses to lower their heads very far and some horses fight with their neighbors if given any leeway. Yet when possible, allow the horses to take advantage of whatever room there is to carry their heads in a natural, mucus-draining posture.

#### 2. Transport horses in familiar, congenial groups.

When shipped with his pals, your horse has less risk of exposure to infectious disease and of suffering injury, and he won't be doubly stressed by dealing with new horses at the same time he's coping with the physical effects of transport.

#### 3. Keep the trailer spotlessly clean.

Pathogens from dried manure can overwhelm a respiratory system weakened by trailer stress. If your trip is a long one, pick manure out of the trailer at each stop. And, at the end of each trip hose out the trailer thoroughly to remove all manure and urine.

#### 4. Educate your horse about loading and shipping.

Loading is the most stressful part of the entire shipping experience and the time when injuries are most likely to happen. Make sure your horse is thoroughly familiar and comfortable with the whole procedure. If your horse is a particularly difficult loader, it's wise to get the help of an experienced and patient trainer to help rebuild his confidence. And, even if you never go anywhere, load your horse several times a year and drive around the neighborhood as a refresher.

#### 5. Maintain good air quality inside the trailer.

Unless you are shipping in the coldest, wettest climates in an open stock trailer, the risk of horses getting too cold is minimal compared to the risks associated with stagnant air, accumulating exhaust fumes and excessive heat. When in doubt about the temperature, blanket the horses and leave open air vents or windows. To check for drafts, ride in the back of an empty trailer, and adjust vents and windows to redirect any strong blasts that could chill the horses. Keeping rear windows closed, using floor mats without bedding and wetting hay are measures that reduce amount of dust in the trailer.

#### 6. Rest horses at least a week after a long journey.

Shipping-induced physical changes that leave a horse vulnerable to illness can persist for days after the trip is over. To ensure you don't stress an already compromised horse, plan for the horse to arrive at his destination a week before he'll be asked for a major athletic effort.

#### 7. Keep the trailer in good repair.

Eliminate any opportunity for vehicle failure by regularly checking and repairing your trailer as needed. Pay particular attention to the floorboards, ramp, brakes and hitch. If anything looks suspicious, don't use the trailer until it is professionally inspected and fixed.

#### 8. Be a sympathetic driver.

While there have been no large-scale studies of the effects of driver technique on shipped horses, researchers agree that a slower, steady journey is easier than an erratic, speedy one. Take a ride in the back of an empty trailer yourself to experience the differences in driving styles firsthand. A useful test of your own driving ability is to place a half-full glass of water on the dashboard. If you can drive without the water sloshing to the three-quarters level on the glass, your driving is passenger friendly.

#### 9. Provide ample water and adequate hay but no grain.

Water during travel is essential for battling dehydration, a common side effect of shipping that can lead to other, more serious problems. At every stop, or at least every four hours, offer horses water from home in a familiar bucket. Many in-transit horses won't drink during the first eight hours on the road and some may never partake, but continue to offer anyway. Hay is a great pacifier of traveling horses and helps retain water in the gut. In certain trailers, however, the hay dust may blow directly into a horse's respiratory tract. Wetting the hay can help to control the dust. Researchers agree that feeding grain to traveling horses is not a good idea. If stress affects gut function, as they suspect it does, the grain will sit and ferment, possibly leading to colic or laminitis.

#### 10. Cater to each horse's individual preferences.

Perhaps the most important thing to keep in mind when shipping is the preference of each horse. Some horses travel quietly in situations others find intolerable. Experiment with every variable-traveling positions, watering routines, even the time of day you travel--until you find a combination that suits your horse or the majority of the horses that normally travel together.







# LET ME SAY THIS...ABOUT THAT

After a very successful 2019 GERL Help a Horse Campaign where we were able to adopt out 15 horses from the GDA equine program as well as a couple from our foster program. Most came from the Mansfield barn. Everybody agrees that the two prison impounds need to have horses. Both prisons have 4 horses at this time. After I moved Sandy and Yankee to my farm, there were only 3 horses left at the Mansfield impound barn. The day I went to Mansfield to pick them up 2 new horses had just been brought in. Both were very skinny and there was a 3<sup>rd</sup> one that came in with them and she was down at the Pulaski prison impound getting rehabbed. It has been a very long time since there has been only 3 horses at the Mansfield facility. It also meant lower feed and vet bills for GERL.

The GDA is supposed to be a revolving door; horses come in, get fat, healthy (and castrated, if a stallion) and go to a new forever home. For a long time we had grown to a place where our revolving door was rusty and not moving very fast. With the campaign behind us it is clear to see that that was the oil that was so badly needed to get things moving. It was a lot of hard work, weekly meetings, several photo sessions, writing BIOs, etc., but it paid off in the end and also proved that you can rehome pasture ornaments and other "at risk" horses if you're willing to put forth a little effort.

A few weeks later there were 10 new arrivals at Mansfield, but luckily there were a lot of minis among them and they are always easy to place. I'm hoping that things will be able to continue turning with the horses coming in and getting placed within a reasonable amount of time, now that the numbers are down. I'm looking for a team that would be willing to help us with future campaigns if you have some extra time and the interest. Please contact me.

On a different note, things with the Rescue Challenge are in full swing. Everybody on the Rescue Challenge Committee is a little worried about the low-ticket sales. We are suffering from the lack of a marketing person to help us with this problem that has existed at least for the last eleven years that I have been President. I'm constantly reminded that nobody knows GERL. I am not a marketing person. I am a project manager. My goals for this organization have been aimed towards fixing our horse problems with good common-sense programs. I feel that I have done that. My thoughts about marketing are more aligned with the "build it and they will come" attitude. I feel that if GERL does good things people will spread the word. Does this method take longer? Absolutely! Sometimes I feel like we're moving at a snail's pace. However, we have never had the good fortune of having a public relations or marketing person volunteer to help.

We recently had a "controlled feeder" sale, thanks mainly to CeCe Calli. She was able to sell all the horse feeders that had been donated over a year ago which made enough money to pay for a marketing costs for the upcoming Rescue Challenge. Any monies left over will be used for the upcoming 2021 Rescue Challenge and Georgia Horse Council (GHC) Horse Fair.

Speaking of which, that is probably the most exciting bit of news that I am pleased to pass on. The GHC and GERL have decided to partner together to host a combined Rescue Challenge competition and Horse Fair in April of 2021. We are all excited about the prospect of going bigger and also moving the venue to the Conyers International Horse Park. We're all hoping for some new blood in the way of volunteers. And let me say this about that...the quality of our first (in a long time) GHC Horse Fair comes down to the people who are willing to step up and get out of their daily rut and help us. If you want to see a Horse Fair return to Georgia, please reach out and do something to support one!




