

Spotlight on Our Area Coordinators LeAnn Farris

Hi, my name is LeeAnn Farris. I'm a 47 year old living in northern Harris county on the border with Meriwether and Talbot counties on 45 acres with my active duty army hus-

band, a 16 year old daughter, 4 horses, 4 giant dogs, 2 guinea pigs, 1 African Grey parrot, 10 chickens and 2 tanks of fish.

I fell in love with horses as a small girl when I got Tony the pony for my 7 or 8th birthday. I have been an advocate for pets my entire life and volunteered for rescue organization helping rehabilitate and rehome every type of animal from reptiles to horses.

I grew up in rural Meriwether and

Talbot counties on pig, peanut and watermelon farms. My Mom's family is from this area. My Dad's family is from Long Island NY and I went to high school there. I have a M.Ed and BA in Business Admin from Columbus State

University. I was a big supporter of GERL in the early 2000's when I trail rode regularly. A spinal fusion kept me from riding for many years and then we moved often as a

> military family. While living in Italy I founded and ran a non-profit to help families moving to and from Italy with pets. I'm very proud that PCS Pet Project of Italy was able to help over 50 pets and 30 families move successfully to and from Italy and Europe. I still offer the website and my experience if people need help.

When my husband was getting close to retiring, we decided to move back here. My two mares were finally able to be at home with me for

the first time in over 10 years. We recently adopted 2 geldings who needed a new home. I'm very excited to be a part of GERL and help in any way I can.



The Georgia Department of Agriculture Equine Division was called out to a farm where they found approximately 80 horses on 150 acres of land. The local Sheriff's office was also involved. The gentleman who owned the horses also had 50 head of cattle on his property. They were in an area of the state that was suffering from the draught and the owner had no horse quality hay to replace the grass, leaving many of the horses very thin. He was told by the State and County that he had to disperse the herd and he was agreeable to do that. Hence, my association with him. What I gathered from my conversation with him is that he was a backyard breeder of Arabian horses for many years, boasting at times of their bloodline and their value "back in the day". Of course, he had no real breeding program; the stallions and mares ran together, producing an annual supply of offspring year after year.

He and I had several phone conversations during the following weeks, and he mentioned to me that he had a livestock hauler that he was going to call to take the horses. I offered to help with a large herd dispersal from his property in lieu of that, but he declined. All the horses were feral and untouchable and there were many mammas and babies in the herd, as well as large supply of stallions. He did agree to let me have 5 of the babies. I knew that there was another Rescue was involved and he was allowing them to take a few, as well.

He called me on a Friday afternoon and said I needed to come right away because they were loading horses. My sidekick and "go to person", Rylee Nash, and I went over there the next morning. GERL Secretary, Cynthia Anderson, met us there with her horse trailer as a back-up. Most all the big horses were gone when we arrived. The babies and younger horses had been sectioned off on a 5-acre pasture with a catch pen. We picked out a few babies, along with 3 of the thinnest horses, which ended up being 6 instead of 5. We were able to run 4 of them onto my trailer which was backed up to the gate of the catch pen. Cynthia's trailer was loaded with the other 2 babies and off we drove, head-

ed to Bethlehem. There were 4 or 5 other trucks/trailers that arrived as we were leaving that were also picking up horses. I am grateful that he allowed us to come and get a few that will have a better life. He certainly didn't have to do that. I'm guessing that twenty to twenty-five horses were rescued that day.

The "Six Amigos" are currently being rehabilitated with good grain three times a day, alfalfa hay and a round bale of Bermuda at their disposal to get to a healthier weight. Five of the six are stallions that will require castration. They are becoming more trusting with this regimen and diet. Of course, they remain in quarantine until blood can be pulled for Coggins. Afterwards, they will go in pairs to separate foster homes where they will hopefully, become trusting partners.

There are many large herd situations just like this one, all over our state. GERL has had some experience in the past with large herd/hoarding situations. What we learned is that the owners always have a need to be in control of the entire dispersal, making it impossible to accomplish much of anything. The fact that their horses are always feral makes the situation very dangerous to handlers. This brings me to a dilemma: What do we want GERL's role to be in these types of cases going forward? There is no clear answer at this time, but I suspect we'll do what we always do... take each situation as they come and cross that bridge when we come to it!

Puttin' On The Feed Bag Recipe

Shicken Noodle Soup

- 1 tsp. extra-virgin olive oil
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1 c. diced onion
- 2 carrots, diced
- 1 lb. boneless skinless chicken breast, cut into 1/2" pieces
- 2 celery stalks, diced
- kosher salt
- Freshly ground black pepper
- 32 oz. low-sodium chicken stock
- 1 c. egg noodles
- 1/4 c. chopped parsley



- In a large pot over medium heat, heat oil. Add onions, celery, and carrots and cook until softened, 6 minutes. Add garlic and thyme and cook until fragrant, 1 minute more.
- 2. Move vegetables to one side of the pot and add chicken. Season with salt and pepper and cook
- until no pink remains, 6 to 8 minutes. Add stock and 1/2 cup of water and bring to a boil.
- 3. Add noodles and cook according to package instructions. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Add parsley and serve immediately.

GDA and Other Updates

For those of you who like to know where GERL spends your donated dollars, below is an update since our last quarterly newsletter:

- GERL provided \$1,857 to assist individuals under our Crisis Intervention Program. The money went toward feed, hay and vet care while their owners overcome short term issues such as job loss or medical issues.
- GERL provided \$2,040 for vet care for horses at the various GDA facilities.
- GERL provided \$4,116 for feed and hay for the horses at the Lee Arrendale and Pulaski Prisfacilities. on
- GERL provided \$450 for the castration of 2 stallions for Hall County Animal Control.
- GERL provided \$3,135 for a metal carport and panels for a equine holding pen for Oconee County Animal Control.

Several changes have recently occurred on the GERL Board of Directors and will be effective January 1, 2020. Our current Vice-President, Tamma Trump, who has given GERL 4 years of her life, has decided to follow a dream and move to Tennessee, along with her sister and brother-in-law. I want to thank Tamma from the bottom of my heart for the sacrifices that she has made by filling the lead position of the annual Rescue Challenge event for the 6 years it has existed. She has done a marvelous job of growing this event every year, making it better. Tamma has also been a wonderful confidant to me as Vice President and I will miss her! GERL wishes the best for Tamma as she starts a new chapter with her horses and family.

Cynthia Anderson, our current GERL Secretary, will take Tamma's place as Vice President. She also has taken over the responsibility of orchestrating the law enforcement training meetings that we host, annually. Cynthia recently retired from her job as Biology Professor and GERL has gained a gem! She also serves as an Area Coordinator for Baldwin and Putnam counties.

Cynthia's position as GERL Secretary will be filled by our long-time Auction Coordinator and Area Coordinator, Sue Wrensen. Sue recently retired from her full-time job as a teacher in Cherokee county and we are very grateful that she has agreed to step in and fill this important position for GERL.

CeCe Calli has graciously agreed to take the Lead on the Rescue Challenge. She has her work cut out for her since we'll be moving the event to a new venue in 2021. In addition, CeCe will continue to hold the positions as Foster and Adoption Coordinator as she has

done for many years, as well as serving as the Area Coordinator for Hart, Franklin and Elbert counties.

Jacki Moore recently volunteered to be our Flea Market Coordinator. I'm pinching myself because I don't have to handle this job, anymore! Jacki likes to clean tack and what a difference she has made to our ability to move the used tack that is donated to GERL. Thank you, Jacki!

I hope that you will join me in thanking each of our Board members and other volunteers for the many hats that they wear for GERL, not to mention their dedication and sacrifices! I think they are AWESOME!

Of course, I have already started thinking about our goals for 2020. I see a shift coming in the amount of support that we've been providing to the Georgia Department of Agriculture Equine Division. I believe in the future we are going to be lending more support to law enforcement and county animal control agencies in lieu of the GDA. The reason for this is because the GDA is picking up fewer horses, which is forcing the counties to take a more active role in equine abuse and neglect.

We furnished two equine holding facilities this year at the cost of approximately \$3,000 each. The shelters typically consist of a metal carport and panels. We currently have two additional counties that have called to inquire about a shelter for their facility. As a matter of fact, GERL has furnished more shelters and had more inquiries about shelters in the last two years than the past 9 years that we have offered them And, let me say this about that, GERL is happy to provide these shelters if the counties are willing to prosecute the neglectors and abusers. 2020 is going to be full of changes. Hang on for the ride!

She has worked so hard with the Rescue Challenge and other aspects of GERL. For those of you that may be unaware, Tamma is relocating to Tennessee at the end of this year. In April GERL Kicked off its own Help a Horse Campaign. This turned out to be one of the most successful events of the year; Not in a financial sense but finding forever homes for 15 horses' type of success. The food and camaraderie at the event were awesome.

In June of this year we were asked by Jones and Oconee counties to assist them with the purchase of shelters and fencing for their new equine holding pens they wanted to add to their Animal Control facilities. GERL is happy to help any county law enforcement entity that is willing to prosecute animal neglect and cruelty and has been offering this support to law enforcement for the past 10 years.

In July GERL held a very successful Equine Training for Law Enforcement and Animal Control in La-Grange. This is a very important program that is hosted twice a year by GERL. These programs provide hands on training with equine, instruction on how identify cruelty and neglect, how to investigate a case, and what the prosecutor is looking for in able to successfully prosecute an animal cruelty case.

In early October we held the 6th annual GERL Rescue Challenge. We had a great turn out. All the trainers, horses, and judges were excellent. 


Update on PL Charger





GERL Hosts the Equine Training for Law Enforcement and Animal Control in Cobb County

The Georgia Equine Rescue League Ltd. (GERL) hosted the second successful Equine Training for Law Enforcement and Animal Control for the year In Cobb County on November 25th 2019. Over 67 Law enforcement and Animal Control officer were in attendance along with a



student from the University of Kentucky's Equine Management Program.

GERL is ecstatic to see these officers taking advantage of this unique training opportunity. We are also very happy to see that some of the Equine programs at major Universities are starting to take notice of what we do. This is the second time we have had a student ask to attend. So, what exactly is this training, who are our experts, why it is so important, and what do we hope to accomplishment.

GERL is the only organization to offer this unique training opportunity for law enforcement and Animal Control. Well, what makes it unique? We offer this training at no cost to the Law enforcement officers and Animal control officers. Every year law enforcement officers are required to have professional development. GERL's training provides Law enforcement with 5 hours POST credit. This may be one of the only free professional development opportunities provided by any organization in the state of Georgia.

We start by introducing GERL and explain what services we can provide to the counties in Georgia. We provide training to help them when they are dealing with a case of equine at large, or dealing with a neglect or cruelty case. What we ask in return for our help is that the counties prosecute the offenders.

We are able to provide this training because of the like-minded volunteers that are dedicated to help solve the problem of the unwanted horse, abuse and neglect in Georgia. The following are our expert presenters:

Mat Thompson from the Department of Agriculture (GDA), is the first to present. Mat Thompson manages the GDA Equine Health Section which is responsible for enforcing the Humane Care for Equines Act of 1992, the Equine Act of



1969 and excerpts of the Animal Protection Act. Enforcement of these laws is achieved through the inspection of equine sales, abuse complaints, licensing stables, and events under his direction. Mat Thompson provides information on Georgia Equine Protection Laws and explains what constitutes equine abuse. He teaches attendees how to body score horses. He then takes the officers outside to demonstrate safe horse handling techniques. This includes how body language affects the horse, where to stand to avoid injury, how to catch, halter, lead, and load. The officers then have the opportunity to practice what they have learned on a horse provided by the GDA.

Next up is Kevin Hearst -he Retired from the position or Field Supervisor/Chief Cruelty Investigator for Dekalb County Animal Services. Kevin has been a member of the National Animal Cruelty Investigations School faculty for over seven years and is recognized as an expert in the field of animal cruelty investigations. This school is recognized as one of the leaders in education for humane investigators. Kevin is asked to and does delivered many presentations for conferences throughout the nation. He also served as liaison In-service instructor for DeKalb Co. Police Academy, Sheriff Office, Code Enforcement, Emergency Management Agency and District Attorney & Solicitor-General's offices. He is an expert witness in animal cruelty cases due to his extensive knowledge, training, and experience in animal cruelty/equine, dangerous animal and blood sports investigations. Kevin's presentations are entertaining as well as informative. He concentrates on the proper way to carry out and document animal abuse cases. He always provides humorous accounts of his personal mistakes and successes. He has the attendees participate in group case studies of actual cruelty case. This provides the officers with a chance to look at evidence and discuss the actual aspects of the case while he provides positive feedback. He provides instruction on how to present a prosecutable case to the district attorney, how to testify, how to become an expert witness. This information is invaluable to the training of law enforcement and animal control,

GERL's 9th Annual Stallion to Gelding Castration Days a Success

The Unwanted Horse Coalition's (UHC) recent Study on Contributing Factors Surrounding the Unwanted Horse Issue is the first of its kind to assess the causes and magnitude of the unwanted horse population in the United States.

Results indicate that the problem of unwanted horses is perceived to be growing on many fronts. More than 90% of participants believe the number of unwanted horses, as well as those neglected and abused, is increasing. Almost all participants (87%) indicate that in the past year, the issue of unwanted horses has become "a big problem," compared with only 22% who said the problem was important three years ago. Respondents also report that the number of horses being euthanized is increasing.

In 2010 GERL formed a partnership with area equine veterinarians. Not only to provide low cost castration clinics, but to educate the public on the problems of over-breeding. The second Sat of November was established as Stallions to Geldings Day and veterinarians throughout the state would volunteer their time, staff and expertise to host clinics where horses could be castrated for only \$100.00. GERL would pay \$50.00 and the horses' owner would be responsible for the remaining \$50.00. Usual cost for a castration is from \$200.00/\$500.00.

Over the past couple years, it has become difficult for many of our veterinarians to hold their clinics on a designated day and have chosen a different date and in some cases a week or even a month to host their clinics for the \$100.00 fee.

I'd like to take the opportunity to thank the thirteen veterinarians that have so generously given of their time, expertise and staff to make our 2019 Stallion to Gelding Month a huge success. To date we have 80 less stallions in Georgia. That brings our total number of horses castrated through our programs to 1,106 stallions since 2010! There are a couple of veterinarians that have not completed their castrations for 2019 so we expect this total to increase.

If any of these fine doctors happen to be your veteri-

narian, please give them a big GERL welcome and let them know how much you appreciate them and what they're doing to help with the problems of the unwanted horse.

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
