# GERL Goes To Ranger Camp By Patty Livingston



The Georgia Equine Rescue League (GERL) partnered up with Equine Immersion Project (EIP), based out of New Hampshire and whose mission is to support service members and families utilizing the healing power of the horse. The two-day workshop was held at the Army Ranger Camp Merrill in Dahlonega, Georgia following a recent weather-related accident that claimed the lives of two Ranger medics.

My friend, Amy Cox, and I trailered our horses to Camp Merrill to join up with seven other horses that were furnished by Beyond Limits and Rails N Trails. Home Base was another sponsor of this event, along with OnPoint 1-1.

We were located on their air strip which was a huge oval paved runway with lots of grassy areas in the middle and sides.

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They started out the day with each medic selecting a horse and learning how to groom, then, moving on to leading. There were 10 horses and 10 medics on day one and they progressed by leading their horse through a small obstacle course.


We broke for lunch which was delivered out on the airstrip. It was a good opportunity to get to know one another better and answer questions about the horses. As soon as lunch was over, everyone was asked to switch horses. They couldn't believe it when they were asked to ride bareback. We acted as spotters and walkers while this was accomplished. Every one of them tackled this task easily.

We finished the day with a short trail ride into the woods. Everyone enjoyed spending time with the horses, and they thanked us several times. I think the trail ride was everyone's favorite.

At the end of the day, Amy and I had to figure out where we were going to stash our horses for the night. (We were staying in a cabin nearby with all of the folks from EIP.) She came up with the idea of taking them to the R Ranch, which was about twenty minutes away. She called and found out that the stable manager at the R Ranch was a retired Army Ranger. He was about to leave for the night but said he would wait for us. When we arrived, he had 3 stalls waiting with hay and water. Big thanks to Herbert Kirkover at the R Ranch for helping us out on such short notice..

At the end of the day, we were all treated to a cookout at the camp bar.

GERL was able to help out financially by paying for the cost of the other 7 horses that were utilized by the



Ranger medics for the two-day workshop. We are also currently discussing a future collaboration with EIP to create "continuity of care" that would enable our military (and their families) to attend these types of workshops wherever needed.

It was a gratifying two days and I was so glad that Amy and I were able to be a part of it!

### Cindy and Cherokee a story about the wife of a veteran, horses, loss, and never giving up.

Over ten years ago Cindy, a veteran's wife, owned a brown and white horse named Cherokee. Cindy has spent her life either working on a large horse and cattle operation or caring for people. Her home is behind and was once the property Waypoint "River" Ranch occupies today.

Our neighbors Cindy and her husband Dave, an 82nd Airborne Vietnam veteran, started helping us build the new location 'veterans ranch' by bringing meals and knowledge of the area. It is true, military families look out for each other, giving support to those in need and living by the idea that Vets Help Vets. Stephanie and the team felt that Cindy should get a chance to have horses in her life again. As a military spouse you cannot always make forever connections because there are so many changes and one of Cindy's losses was her horse Cherokee whom she loved and had to sell over 10 years ago.

The ranch was able to make space for Cindy to have a new horse and help them both. Cindy began to search

for her next horse and was drawn to a horse who reminded her of Cherokee standing in a pasture not very far away. When she arrived, there was no question that she was going to buy this horse and nothing was going to stop her because not only did the horse remind her of Cherokee, the horse was her beloved Cherokee. Cherokee jumped right in the WPR trailer and headed to her new home. Against all odds and father time Cindy was reunited with her horse again.

Cherokee is a paint horse, and her markings are unique and never changing. Her habits of raising her leg while eating and giving neck hugs remain. Cherokee is currently in rehabilitation from years of neglect, founder, and lack of veterinary care. But clearly, they remembered each other, sharing neck hugs and butt scratches. Cherokee is now a happy horse who is working with her veteran family and other families that visit the ranch. She has found new friends within the herd and is enjoying the freedom and safety the herd provides. Cindy is spending every day with her horse and learning about the life of a therapy horse and how that work helps veteran families while helping all the horses that live out their lives at the ranch.

The 'River' Ranch is the second location for Waypoint Ranch's Peace at Home Project for Georgia military families. It's located in Meriwether County in a remote area yet close to Ft. Benning and Warner Robbins. A place where combat veterans and their families can be immersed in the art of old school horsemanship among a free roaming herd of rescued and sanctuary horses on 100 remote acres beside the Flint River.

The Ranch provided them with an immersion style retreat. During retreats we, as a team, have the opportunity to gather around the fire, share meals and heal, surrounded by horses and the protective ridge and the river. Together we all participate in and provide therapies that work. Therapies that include horses, horsemanship, trauma focused equine therapy (TF-EAP), accelerated resolution therapy (ART), adaptive yoga, and functional medicine with chiropractic. ## Puttin' On The Feed Bag Recipe

#### **Ingredients**

- 3 large chicken breasts, boneless, skinless, and cut into cutlets
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/4 teaspoon ground black pepper
- 6 tablespoons all-purpose
- 2 tablespoons olive oil
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 3 cloves garlic, crushed
- 1 cup chicken stock
- 1 cup heavy cream

- 1/2 cup parmesan cheese,
- 1 teaspoon chili flakes
- 1/4 teaspoon oregano
- 1/4 teaspoon thyme
- 1/3 cup sundried tomatoes, chopped
- 1 tablespoon fresh basil leaves, optional, chopped, for garnish
- pasta, optional, for serving
- rice, optional, for serving



## Recipe: Marry Me Chicken

**Directions** 

- **Step 1**: Season the chicken generously with salt and pepper.
- Step 2: Submerge in flour and shake off any excess.
- Step 3: Heat the olive oil and melt the butter in a large skillet over medium heat on the stove-top.
- Step 4: Add the chicken to the skillet, cooking until you have a golden brown color on each side, about 4-5 minutes per side.
- **Step 5**: Remove the chicken to a plate and cover with foil.
- Step 6: Add the garlic to the same skillet and sauté until fragrant, about 1 minute.
- Step 7: Add the chicken stock, scraping any brown bits that got stuck to the bottom of the pan with a wooden spoon.
- Step 8: Reduce the heat to medium-low and add the heavy cream and the parmesan to the skillet.
- Step 9: Allow the sauce to simmer for a few minutes.
- Step 10: Add the chili flakes, thyme, and oregano. Season with salt and pepper, to taste.
- Step 11: Add the sundried tomatoes.
- Step 12: Return the chicken to the skillet with the sauce and simmer until the sauce has thickened, about 3 minutes.
- Step 13: Garnish with chopped basil and serve over pasta or rice!

#### **GERL Dollars at work in Baldwin County**

Animal Control in Baldwin County Georgia is stepping up to the plate when it comes to enforcing animal cruelty and neglect. Officer Summer Bilbey is on a mission to make life better for all the animals in Baldwin County.

On October 6, 2021, Rebecca Husted suggested that Summer reach out to Georgia Equine Rescue League (GERL) to see if we could take in a draft horse and a donkey that were the subject of an animal cruelty case. The problem for Baldwin County was animal control had no facility for horses or other large animals.

Until recently Baldwin county has not picked up large animals. Instead they relied on the Georgia Department of Agriculture (GDA) to handle any reported problem. In 2020, the GDA stopped picking up equine, instead handing over the responsibility to local law enforcement. This has strained many county animal control budgets. They do not have the funding to build shelters for large animals. Just a few weeks later on October 25, 2021, they had another case. (This time there were three horses. Once again, no where to put them.) They reached out to GERL for help.

GERL agreed to purchase a shelter for animal control. Now Baldwin County Animal Control has the facilities to house large animals. They recently picked up another horse that is now enjoying the shelter.

Because Baldwin County Animal Control is prosecuting these offenders, GERL is helping with a vet check and a Coggins for this horse. Soon this girl will be up for adoption by Baldwin County. Due to the neglect and abuse this horse has endured she is not ridable. She is sweet and will make a great companion horse for someone.

It is just such a wonderful feeling knowing that GERL really is making a difference in the lives of abused and neglected horses in Georgia.

#### November is Stallion to Gelding Month in Georgia

The Georgia Equine Rescue League (GERL) created a state-wide castration program in January of 2010 called the Stallion to Gelding Castration Program in compliance with their goal of reducing the number of starved, abused and neglected horses in the state.

At this time GERL was able to form partnerships with veterinarians throughout the state to provide assessable, safe and economical clinics to assist in controlling the overpopulation in our state. The first clinic was held on the second Saturday of November 2010.

After many years, participating veterinarians realized the impact and importance of the clinics and most have agreed to perform castrations throughout the entire month of November and a couple have extended their castrations throughout the month of December.

A list of participating veterinarians this year will be listed on the GERL website (www.gerlltd.org) under the listing of Programs->Stallion to Gelding on October 1, 2022. Phone numbers of participating veterinarians will be listed. Each veterinarian makes their own schedules, so participants are asked to call the number listed on the website and set up an appointment. No application needed.

This year, the equine owners/clients will pay \$100.00 and GERL will pay \$75.00 for the cost of each castration.

To date, 1,245 horses have been castrated through this program. GERL feels fortunate to have partnerships with veterinarians who generously donate their time and expertise to make this program such a success.

We are in need of veterinarians in Middle and South Georgia. Please reach out to any equine vets that you think may be interested in participating in our program.

## **LET ME SAY THIS...ABOUT THAT**

I was more than a little excited about the prospect of having no foster horses at my farm. I had just delivered Gypsy, a 22-year-old mustang mare I had been fostering since June, to her new foster home. And, after having Boone return, I was successful in getting him adopted almost immediately and he was to be picked up the following week. I was so close and suddenly everything changed with one phone call.

The Georgia Equine Rescue League (GERL) recently worked with law enforcement to seize a large number of horses (more than ten) involved in a starvation situation. The owner refused to release any of the horses which means that they are now evidence in court. So, while they are in our care, they cannot be altered (castrated) or adopted out. In addition, GERL cannot publish photos and information on social media until the case goes to court.

This puts us in a bit of a pickle. This is our slowest time of the year with regard to donations flowing in. We already have financial commitments to veteran related non-profit organizations whose horses we are feeding. Taking on a large number of horses that we will have to hold for an unknown period of time is scary, but not enough to make us baulk. I know that horse people have HUGE hearts and as news of this dribbles out, I'm sure the donations will come to help us take care of them.

Taking care of a large number of horses is very labor intense without help every day. Just feeding that many can be exhausting and by the time you are finished it is time for the second feeding. (They are being fed three times a day.) If you're involved in horses, you already know how much work is involved, especially if they also need to be doctored or groomed. Despite the work, it is a very rewarding task to watch them settle in and get comfortable with their new surroundings. I am excited to see how good they will look when they start gaining weight.

The largest number of horses are currently being fostered by one person. We will be looking for separate foster homes for these horses which include babies, stallions, mares and geldings of all ages and condition. We have a few considered "critical care" and they will remain in their current foster homes until they are well enough to go elsewhere, if necessary. And let me say this about that...our role right now is actually doing what we do best...rehabilitation!



big GERL flea market. Boone had just been delivered to my farm by the Walton County Animal Control and




Boone and Casper sharing a pasture from day one.


#### **GERL Goes To Little Creek Horse Farm**



This girl was beyond head shy, thought your touch was acid and wasn't afraid to use her feet to protect her. So, we called on Tinker Moffett for his help. Luna spent a month with Tinker but wasn't really giving up her ways. Everything was just a huge deal to her. Although she was much better, it was kind of a crap shoot if she would allow you to halter her, and if you did get that far, most things went down hill from there.

After leaving Tinker's, she arrived back at my farm and I thought she was doing good being tied to the hitching post. I then walked her to her new paddock behind my house. She loved it! The grass was lush. For two days I didn't see her eyes.

Luna is fed in her stall and haved in the hay rack out side. She was chilling out so it was time for the dreaded halter. I did get her halter on and walked her to her hay. For the next few days Luna got her halter on about 20 times a day in her stall (she has the freedom to go back and forth to her stall and paddock). She was getting so good that I got cocky and started asking her to trust me in her lush green paddock. It took a bit of time. I think she figured out I wasn't leaving until the deed was done. 
